Oshio college has two sister schools. The first school is Atlantic Institute of Oriental Medicine (ATOM) located in Fort Lauderdale, Florida, USA. Credits earned at our college are recognized by the institute. There, you may study TCM for one academic year and receive your Bachelor Degree of Science and Masters Degree of Oriental Medicine. In order to do this you need to have three-years of TCM education in our college and have two years or more of post-secondary education background before you are enrolled into our college. The second sister school is Hunan University of Traditional Chinese Medicine located in Changsha, China. If you wish to spend your last school year in China studying and practicing TCM, you may go there.

With a highly qualified and very experienced team of instructors, smaller class settings, ocean and mountain view classrooms, and a very high success rate with student satisfaction, we are sure that you will reach your goal while attending our college.

Mission Statement

Our sincere purpose is to achieve a higher standard of education and professionalism within the practice of Traditional Chinese Medicine. Oshio College believes that by providing highly qualified, enthusiastic instructors in a professional well-managed environment we can obtain this purpose.

Objectives of the College

The intent of Oshio College of Acupuncture and Herbology is:

1. To provide a 3-year academic program in Acupuncture.
2. To provide a comprehensive 4-year academic program in Traditional Chinese Medicine (TCM).
3. To provide an advanced 5-year TCM doctor program.
4. To make available to the public clinical services utilizing Oriental Medicine and Acupuncture in order to provide opportunities for our students to observe and apply techniques.
5. To prepare students for Licensing Examinations in B.C., the rest of Canada and anywhere in the Western World.
6. To prepare students to become highly qualified Doctors of Traditional Chinese Medicine (5 years), Practitioners of Traditional Chinese Medicine (4 years) and Acupuncturists (3 years), all including the unique knowledge of Oriental Medicine.
7. To meet and exceed the requirements of the College of Traditional Chinese Medicine Practitioners and Acupuncturists of British Columbia (CTCMA, Provincial Licensing Board).

Academic Year, Enrollment and Tuition Fee

Admission Requirements

Oshio College of Acupuncture & Herbology (Canadian-Pacific College of Traditional Chinese Medicine & Acupuncture) accepts applications from all persons who have completed a high school education, and two years of post-secondary education or the equivalent (this pre-requisite may not be necessary to applicants from outside British Columbia, Canada). OCAH seeks students who show the potential to become caring, dedicated and skilled practitioners of Traditional Oriental Medicine, and who can demonstrate the maturity and preparation necessary to undertake the challenges of the program. Oshio College is committed to a policy of equal opportunity. Admission is open to all qualified applicants. Equal educational opportunities will be provided to all persons, regardless of race, religion, gender, national origin, marital status, sexual preference, age or physical handicap.

Hours of Instruction

Full-time students attend twenty or more hours of classes per week, which includes clinical training and study review. In total, approx. 2,070 hours will be offered for the Acupuncture program (3 academic years), approx. 2,805 hours for the Traditional Chinese Medicine (TCM) program (4 academic years), and 3510 hours for the Doctor of Traditional Chinese Medicine Program (5 academic years). Each program builds on the other so all students complete the same first three academic years if enrolled in the three year, four year or five year program. This allows easy transfer between programs.

Academic Year

We enroll students three times a year, January, May and September. One academic year is 30 weeks. It usually starts on the first week of each of these months. New students are urged to register as early as possible. Late registration is accepted on special approval of the Principal, depending on the space available. There is a two-week Christmas break and a one-week clinical assessment week in February.

When enrolling for a September start date classes run:

- 1st year: September to April
- 2nd year: September to April
- 3rd year: September to April
- 4th year: May to November
- 5th year: January to August

Enrollment for January and May classes is available. The students starting in January or May have advantage that the 5 year academic program can be finished within 4 years or the 4 year academic program can be finished within three years.

January class---- starting from January:

- 1st year: January to August
- 2nd year: September to April
- 3rd year: May to November
- 4th year: January to August
- 5th year: September to April

May class----- starting from May:

- 1st year: May to November
- 2nd year: January to August
- 3rd year: September to April
- 4th year: May to November
- 5th year: January to August

Detailed schedules will be mailed to successful applicants.

Tuition Fees and Book and Supply Cost

All Diploma Programs are approximately 22 instructional hours per week for 30 weeks (an academic year). A credit hour is given for every 15 hours of classroom instruction, or for 30 hours of supervised clinical practice. Tuition for one credit hour is \$190 Canadian dollars. For example, if you take 39 credit hours in the first academic year, your tuition in the first academic year will be: 39 credits X \$190 = \$7,410.

One thousand four hundred and ten dollars should be paid on the first day of the school year accompanied by six post-dated checks in the amount about \$1,000 each, beginning the first day of the second month through the first day of the seventh month. Students who do not pay their tuition on time will be penalized. Tuition will not increase after enrollment.

Students should make allowance for approximately \$500 in book costs, workshops and student registration fees with the CTCMA per academic year. These costs are not included in the tuition fee.

Application for Admission

Interested applicants should fill out the application form for admission and send it to the College for consideration. A letter of acceptance will be mailed to all accepted applicant as soon as possible. All applications, foreign and domestic, must be accompanied by a non-refundable application processing deposit of \$100.00. Application fees are not credited towards tuition. Upon acceptance a \$500.00, non-refundable, tuition deposit is required to hold your seat in the program.

Evaluation of Academic Achievements

Each student must attend classes regularly with a minimum of 80% attendance required in order to write the final examination for a given course. Students must achieve a minimum of a 60% or “pass” grade in order to pass each course. They must also achieve a minimum of 70% grade on the comprehensive graduation examination in order to graduate from the College.

Transfer of Credits

Transfer credits from another recognized school of TCM may be accepted. However, the number of transfer credits per academic year should not exceed the number of credits (hours) normally earned by a student at the College in one academic year.

Financial Assistance

Applicants who are residents of British Columbia may apply to the BC Student Assistance Program, which administers Canada Student Loans, BC Student Loans, and BC Grants. You can apply for your student loan online at www.bcsap.bc.ca or call the BCSAP to have an application form mailed out to you at 1-800-561-1818. You may also get the necessary information from their website at www.aett.gov.bc.ca/studentervices. Applicants residing outside of British Columbian should contact the student loans office in their region.

The above rules and regulations are subject to review, in order to maintain and upgrade the standards of Oshio College of Acupuncture and Herbology.
